Mom did a really good job today giving each child her attention. She interacted with all three of them. She let two children play with the pretend food, and grocery cart, while she worked with the other child on social emotional. She let one child use one of her baby dolls (instead of a teddy bear) because she said she is very attached to her felt she babies and would understand the activity better if she used her baby doll. She spoke to the child in a very caring voice and asked her how her baby was feeling? The child rocked her baby, back and forth. Mom did a good job taking turns with her baby and showed her how the baby might behave based on the different emotions.



Details of Training:

Child Abuse and Neglect: Recognition, Reporting & Supporting
Kansas law states that most professionals who work with children, including medical professionals, social workers, nurses, educators and others, are mandated reporters and are required by law to report suspicion of child abuse or neglect. This presentation will address areas of risk and protective factors, definitions of child abuse and neglect per Kansas law and provide examples of signs and symptoms. Participants will also learn the appropriate responses to suspected abuse or neglect, discuss what to do in the event of child disclosure and understand Kansas mandated reporter laws. This training is approved



by KDHE for 1.0 child care licensing hours.

Description: We have all heard that a tobacco-free environment is the safest environment for everyone. This webinar will provide tools for you to encourage and congratulate parents who plan/hope to quit tobacco. Motivate them to ask more questions and feel comfortable accessing the multiple free resources available in Kansas to assist them. Let them know that they can quit and stay quit by participating in a tobacco dependency treatment counseling program.

Learning Objectives:

- Increase knowledge about the harms of secondhand smoke, thirdhand smoke, and vaping, especially for children.
- Understand why tobacco-free environments protect children and families.
- Be familiar with challenges in quitting tobacco, cessation resources and the free Kansas Tobacco Quitline services.
- Consider conversations with parents and others about limiting or quitting tobacco use and referring them to cessation resources.

Exciting News: Supporting Care Providers Expands and Evolves!

From Kansas City Area **Parents as Teachers Consortium to Supporting Care Providers of Kansas**

Since 2006, the Kansas City Area Parents as Teachers Consortium has been dedicated to empowering care providers through personalized home visits. We're thrilled to announce a significant milestone in our journey: a new partnership with the Kansas Parents as Teachers Association (KPATA) and a name change to Supporting **Care Providers of Kansas!**

This exciting evolution allows us to broaden our reach and further strengthen our commitment to supporting those who provide essential care within our communities.

Focusing on Family, Friend, Neighbor (FFN) Care

Our program currently focuses on providing vital home visiting services to Family, Friend, Neighbor (FFN) child care providers residing in Johnson and Wyandotte Counties who care for children of color or children from lowincome families.

FFN care plays a crucial role in the lives of many families. It encompasses child care provided by individuals with an existing relationship to the child, outside of traditional, licensed settings. This often includes grandparents, aunts and uncles, older siblings, close friends, and trusted neighbors.

FFN care is characterized by its informal, relationship-based nature, offering families flexibility and often incorporating culturally relevant practices and language. Whether paid or unpaid, this form of care is indispensable, especially for families facing limited access to formal child care options.

What Does Supporting Care Providers of Kansas Offer?

Our program provides valuable resources and support through personalized home visits, empowering FFN care providers to create enriching and nurturing environments for the children in their care.

We utilize the Parents as **Teachers Supporting Care** Providers Through Personal Visits Curriculum, ensuring evidence-based practices are shared during each home visit. In addition to personalized guidance, providers also receive children's books and curriculum materials to support their caregiving efforts. This provides them with tangible tools to enhance learning and development in the children 913-731-4834 for further they care for. Services are provided in both English and Spanish, ensuring accessibility for a wider range of providers. We offer guidance on child development, age-appropriate activities, and strategies to enhance the caregiving experience.




DID YOU KNOW?

CHILD CARE PROVIDERS PARTICIPATING IN CACFP RECEIVE REIMBURSEMENT FOR MEALS AND SNACKS WHEN AN INFANT IS PROVIDED WITH PUMPED BREAST MILK OR IS BREAST ON SITE, EVEN AFTER THE CHILD'S FIRST BIRTHDAY. CACFP BEST PRACTICE ENCOURAGES PERSONS TO SUPPLY BREAST MILK FOR THEIR INFANTS IN CHILD CARE AND OFFER A QUIET, AREA THAT IS COMFORTABLE AND SANITARY FOR PERSONS WHO COME ON-SITE TO BREASTFEED. BREAST MILK CAN BE USED TO MEET THE FLUID MILK REQUIREMENT IN THE CACFP PROGRAM FOR CHILDREN OVER 12 MONTHS OF AGE. ANOTHER BENEFIT TO PARTICIPATING IN THE CACFP IS ACCESS TO FREE TRAINING!
