SUCCESS STORY

Mom has been very attentive on all of our visits. She has continued to use some of the activities I brought such as nursery rhymes and is always eager to show me what new things [child] is doing. This month Mom got [child] in to get his immunizations up to date and has reported that she made a WIC appt. I also made a referral to the infant toddler program. Mom signed for services for physical therapy for [child]. While he does not have any current delays, there is concern that he will be in the future if he does not receive physical therapy now for a congenital birth defect. Mom was happy to learn that physical therapy will be able to come to her as she does not have transportation. Dad has been а participant on 2 of the visits this month. While Mom seems to be the primary caregiver, Dad is able to tell me about [child]'s day and what he likes and dislikes.



Youth Mental Health First Aid (YMHFA)

6/20 - Garden City 5/2 - DCCCA building - Topeka

YMHFA teaches participants how to identify, understand, and respond to signs of mental health and substance use challenges among children and adolescents ages 12–18, how to respond to a crisis, and how to connect them to help.

YMHFA is designed for any adult who works with youth or has young people in their lives. This training is 8 hours.

ASIST is a resource for the whole community. It helps people apply suicide first-aid in many settings: with family, friends, co-workers, teammates and formal caregiving roles.

ASIST is a two day in person training.

April saw significant progress with four new providers enrolling, thanks to Maria Rios' outreach in Johnson and Wyandotte County elementary schools and PAT programs.

Our program's impact is positive: 100% of participating providers report an improved learning environment due to our home visiting services and resources. As one provider shared, "Maria has been very helpful when providing information that is helping me learn to make changes to how I provide care."



Breastfeeding Message of the Month





CHILD CARE PROVIDERS KNOW THE BABIES IN THEIR CARE!

THEY KNOW WHEN A BABY IS "DOZING" OR NOT FULLY ENGAGED DURING A FEEDING. BREAST MILK IN AN UNFINISHED BOTTLE DOES NOT NEED TO BE DISCARDED IMMEDIATELY IF A BABY DOZES DURING A FEEDING.

A 1-2 HOUR "WINDOW" FOR THE INFANT TO CONTINUE FEEDING FROM THE SAME BOTTLE IS ACCEPTABLE AND IN LINE WITH KDHE REGULATIONS KAR 28-4-116(E)(1)(C) AND KAR 28-4-440(P)(5).



THIS MINIMIZES WASTING BREAST MILK AS PARENTS MAY NOT HAVE EXTRA. SIMPLE SOLUTION TO THE UNFINISHED BOTTLE PROBLEM? START WITH SMALLER AMOUNTS OF BREAST MILK IN THE BOTTLE AND ADD BREAST MILK IF THE INFANT NEEDS MORE. AFTER 2 HOURS, DISCARD THE REMAINING BREAST MILK.
